

# AMERICAN CANYON ARTS FOUNDATION Annual Report of the President to the Membership

1999 has been a full year with many things to do, some new some old. One of the main goals of the Foundation is giving Scholarships. This being the second year, we were able to give Scholarships of \$300 each to two Napa College Art Students. Sonja Paxton with a GPA of 3.96 studying the "Fine Arts" and Sterling Michols studying drama in the "Theater Arts." We will continue to do this as long as we can.

We raised the awards for the Best of Show (\$500) in the June Art Extravaganza, and for the first year have a "Peoples Choice" Award (\$100), which gave the people in attendance a chance to vote on the picture or item they liked the best. The first Place winners in the Children and Youth categories each received \$25. Once again the theme was "Wetlands". We shortened the guide book to a two page prospectus helping with the cost of mailing, and added two new categories, Plein Air and Miniature.

Many hours were put into preparing and collecting items for the Silent Auction but it was well worth the effort. We were so fortunate to have such willing and generous donors.

Again we want to thank the SUTTER HOME WINERY for their generous monetary support as well as supplying all the wine used for the "wine and cheese tasting" during the day of the Art Extravaganza. This is the 4th year that they have helped us. It is a great honor to us knowing they want to help in such a way. Their generosity along with the many donors for the Silent Auction, make it possible for the Foundation to continue our activities. Thank you all so much.

Another first, the night before the Art Extravaganza, following the judging we enjoyed a reception for the artists, as the awards were presented. It seems that we are outgrowing the Chardonnay Club. We had so many paintings some chose not to leave their works for the show because of the lack of space. We are hoping for a larger place next year.

In the spring we were able to plan and print a calendar with the entire years activities. A copy was sent to the City's Community Service Committee which list all the activities for all the organizations in the City.

Our Fields Trips took a new turn when under Cleo Stones leadership, the membership began meeting for lunches and touring the wineries and art galleries. Each time going to a different place. We continued the Plein air trips, as before, for most of the year, weather and health permitting.

I wish to thank all of you for helping me make this year a good one. Especially for those of you fighting health problems making it very hard at times.

- Vice President Lorraine LaVoie: As Membership chairman worked diligently filling our membership roster. Lorraine took care of many responsibilities for each activity of the Foundation as well as her other involvements and the care of her ailing husband. She was always there for me when I needed her.
- Treasurer Rob DaSilva: Although his job responsibilities kept him from attending many of the meetings and important decisions, Rob kept excellent financial records, with every thing spent or received, itemized and accounted for in detail.
- Secretary Bonnie Waxman: Kept detailed records of all the meetings, Correspondence, Plein Air coordinator, Editor of the "INFORMER" newsletter for membership awareness, and as Historian she collected pictures and newspaper article of each happenings of the Foundation. Keeping them in albums for all to see.
- Board Member Iris Daigre: Iris was with us only part of the year bringing her expertise in advertising, as publicist. Having a way with words her articles read like a novel. She wrote a very informative article regarding the June Arts Extravaganza featuring two local artist's Jeanne Smith and Cleo Stone. She nominated Lorraine LaVoie to be one of 41 recipitants, to receive the honor of the "Peace Makers" awards for 1999. Given to local people that "embody the spirit of the Peace table" helping to better the community. Her time with us was too short, we will miss her.
- Board Member Jeanne Smith: Helping in every event and continuing to be faithful to the foundation. Jeanne continues to advertise the different activities of the Foundation in her newsletter at the "World Marine Homes Park" anytime we have flyers she distributes them to all the home owners in the park. She was "Sunshine Chairman" sending cards to the membership that she knew was sick and bereaved. She slowed down only because of her own health and taking care of her ailing Daughter and Sister.
- Board Member Roberta Stanton: So willing anytime we needed a Flyer, Poster, Membership tri-fold, Prospectus for the Christmas boutique, Brochure & Annual covers, Membership cards that were send to each member and anything needed for each activity. All done with a professional look created on her computer. She served this year as Chairman for the Christmas Boutique, everything planned in detail. Personally phoning each vendor to assure them their needs would be taken care of. Because of ill health, most of this work was done from her bed.
- Board Member Cleo Stone: Cleo was instrumental in starting the Social outing we call the "Lunch Bunch". Calling for locations and planning several trips bringing members as well as non-members to get to know each other better. We toured

the different Wineries, Galleries and ended up having a very nice lunch. Also active in the Plein Air outings until her very serious surgery in September. Cleo kept track of all the award ribbons making sure we had enough.

The Foundation was asked to judge at the Citys "Get Ready, Set Draw" art show for the children and youth, sponsored by the City and held in May. This was very interesting and enjoyable day.

This year as President I have enjoyed working with a loyal, faithful, dedicated and over worked Board of Directors. In all our discussion whether we agreed or not we always came together for the good of the Foundation. Our meeting place is the new Boys and Girls club at 650 Benton way. We meet the first Monday of each month, at 7:30 p.m. All is welcome.

Thank you all for helping make this a great year for me as your President, and putting your trust in me for a second year. I am looking forward to bigger and better activities in the year "2000".

For the 1999 year, the American Canyon Arts Foundation's ending balance is \$4,873.30.

This is 35.7% growth from year end 1998 (starting balance of \$3,590.61)

Membership: 38 (opposed to 26 for 1998)

Donations: \$810 vs \$735 for 1998 (decrease in business donations made up by individuals).

Art Extravaganza Entries: 103 works of art from 44 people (1998 had 45 works from 21 people).

June 27, 1999, was our fourth year at the Chardonnay Golf Clubhouse. There were more in attendance, more paintings and more Silent Auction. Each year gets bigger and better.

We had approximately 44 artist's enter 103 items. Beautiful harp music, for her third year, by Katie Spetcht. Judges were Benicia Artist and instructor Capt Lars Wiklund, and Napa Artist and instructor Burton Stutz. It was not an easy task for the judges, there were so many great paintings. The Peoples Choice was won by 17 year old Sherri White with her colored pencil drawing entitles "The Pirate". Sherri also won the 1st place award (\$25) in the 15-17 year old Youth category.

The childrens 8-10 yr old award was won by Anna Rose Holder "Collage Wetlands" Youth 11-14, won by Timothy Matson "Eagle" and 15-17 by Sherri White "The Pirate". Each of the 1st place winners were awarded \$25.

New categories "Plein Air" and "Miniatures" were started this year. Plein Air won by Barbara Beavers "Mondays Wash" and Miniature by Roberta Stanton "Dream Sequence".

First Place Professional "Acrylic" was won by Benicia Artist Wayne Kohler, "Watercolor" by Santa Rosa Artist Muriel Green and "Mixed Media" by Benicia artist Marty Plaisted.

First place Amateur "Mixed Media" and "Water Color" by Louise Cardwell, "oil" Landscape by Maria Pistelli, and an "oil pastel" by Bill Emge.

Beginner "oil" had two first place winners, Donnie Piela with a still life and Lourdes Ilog a Floral. "Ink Design" by Margaret Roach and Pastel by Janet Champion.

Iris and Lorraine were cashier for the day, Jeanne and Cleo past out slips to vote on the Peoples choice, Roberta counted the slips at 4P.M. Candy Mahanay brought fresh flowers for the decorations and Lorraine set up the Silent Auction tables. Fran and Annie were Hostess's.

#### In Loving Memory of RAY LA VOIE

November 10, 1919 - June 23, 1999
